Our school is taking part in the Commissioner's Student Voice Postcard initiative!



Many South Australian primary school aged children are directly supporting the important work of South Australia's Commissioner for Children and Young People, Helen Connolly, as active participants of her annual **Student Voice Postcard** initiative, currently being rolled out to all schools across the State. The initiative is helping Commissioner Connolly gain a clearer understanding of what is important to primary school children. All responses are anonymous. No personal information is collected. The Commissioner will use the postcard responses to inform her advocacy work to improve the lives of SA's children and young people.

'CATCH THEM BEING GOOD' AT BERRI PRIMARY SCHOOL

At Bern Primary School we promote success for all. For many years we had been dedicated to emphasisting, recognising and rewarding positive student behaviour.

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Approximately six years ago, as a school we shifted our focus and also begun hooking at ways of how we could particularly highlight the nucleus who were making stranger choices during their learning times as well. As a pchool community we then allocused and introduced four key Learner Qualities or



Dispositions. We have Collaboration, Persistence, Gurissity, Metacognition, These key Learner Qualities were the foundation for the introduction of our Berri Primary School Levels of Behaviour.

The combination of the school Values/Golden Choices Nominations for yard behaviours coupled with the Learner Qualitical Level class behaviours, really elsevate dour attention on acknowledging students who demonstrated positive behaviours, be it in the class and/or yard.

All southern terms is to 6 operate on a 4-level system with the opportunities for the student choice increasing as the students move through the levels. Students on level 4 are able to choose where they air, with whom they work with and when appropriate allowed to work ourside. They have a growt sense of autonomy and independence.

Moving from level 1 to level 2 is relatively cary and can often be achieved in a ringle lesson. Moving from level 2 to level 3 is more difficult and may take 1 to 2 weeks of suranted effor-Becoming a level 4 student requires many weeks of suranted.




Slowly, she entered into the boat and strongly paddled and paddled until she was satisfied where she was and laid back and gazed at the stars.


